

English:


Learners will read and respond to myth-inspired texts, developing skills in retrieval, inference, and analysis.

Writing will focus on formal and informal letters, ensuring clarity and purpose. Speaking and listening activities will build confidence in communication and presentation.



Maths:

Learners will study statistics, this will involve some or all of the following; interpreting pictograms, bar charts, and line graphs, and working with two-way tables. They will then explore shape, recognizing and naming 2D and 3D forms, counting sides, vertices, and edges, and identifying symmetry. These skills will be applied through practical tasks linked to timelines and data representation.



Our World (Science & History):

Science lessons will connect Greek mythology to electricity, forces, light, and material strength through hands-on investigations. Learners will plan fair tests, record data systematically, and draw evidence-based conclusions. History will focus on Ancient Greece, ordering key events, exploring characters and understanding their significance.



Healthy Lifestyles:

Physical Development will focus on bat and racket sports, promoting teamwork and enjoyment while introducing basic striking and catching skills.

Swimming will continue with progression through Swim England School Swimming Awards. Activities will link to the topic through mythical movement challenges and themed obstacle courses.



Technologies:

Computing will teach safe and critical use of digital tools for researching myths and creating animations or storyboards. Learners will design digital retellings and physical representations of gods, artefacts, and structures. Activities will emphasize creativity, collaboration, and online safety.


Creative Thinking:

Music will explore soundscapes to express character traits and dramatic events, while Art and Design will focus on Greek-inspired sculptures and pottery. Dance and Drama will develop confidence in performance through role-play and characterisation. Learners will use movement and voice to bring myths to life.



Identity and Wellbeing:

The Citizenship unit introduces democracy, exploring its meaning, historical roots, and role in UK society. Learners will engage in debates, role play, and a mock election to understand voting systems and fairness. The unit promotes respect, inclusion, and responsibility.



Careers and Independence:

Food Technology will teach core skills such as knife techniques, heat control, and food hygiene through themed dishes inspired by mythical feasts. Learners will plan and prepare creative dishes with attention to presentation. Lessons will link to career pathways in hospitality and catering.
